

ANTI-BULLYING PLAN 2023

Bulahdelah Central School

Bullying behaviour has three key features. It involves the intentional misuse of power in a relationship. It is ongoing and repeated, and it involves behaviours that can cause harm. The NSW Department of Education requires all NSW public schools to have an Anti-bullying Plan which details the strategies implemented to reduce student bullying behaviours.

Resources

The NSW anti-bullying website (see: https://antibullying.nsw.gov.au/) provides evidence-based resources and information for schools, parents and carers, and students. Schools are encouraged to visit the website to support whole-school prevention, early intervention and response approaches and strategies for student bullying behaviour.

Bulahdelah Central School's commitment

Our school rejects all forms of bullying behaviours, including online (or cyber) bullying by maintaining a commitment to providing a safe, inclusive and respectful learning community that promotes student wellbeing. Executive staff are committed to establishing evidence-based approaches and strategies that promote a positive climate where bullying is less likely to occur.

1 School culture and inclusion

All members of the school community are active participants in building a welcoming school culture that values diversity and fosters positive relationships. A key component of a supportive school culture is building respectful relationships and an ethos that bullying is not accepted, in both online and offline environments. School staff will actively respond to student bullying behaviour.

Our school engages in the following practices to promote a positive school culture.

1.1 Student assemblies

Student bullying and expectations about student behaviour will be discussed and information presented to promote a positive school culture where bullying is not accepted.

Dates	Communication topics
Terms 1 - 4	Implement the core values of the school, during Positive Behaviour for Learning lessons, weekly assemblies and signage displayed around in the classrooms and playground (Behaviour code for students)
Terms 1 - 4	Promotion of safe areas and programs by school staff - passive play, structured play activities, and interest groups to minimise bullying for vulnerable students.
Annually	Culture programs celebrating and promotion of inclusion, acceptance and harmony against students and the school community including NAIDOC Day, R U OK? Day

Annually	Participate in the National Day of Action Against Bullying and Violence and arrange	7
	School Police Liaison Officer presentations on Bullying and Cyber-Safety.	

1.2 Staff communication and professional learning

Staff will be supported with professional learning that provides evidence-based ways to encourage and teach positive social and emotional wellbeing and discourage, prevent, identify, and respond effectively to student bullying behaviour.

Dates	Communication topics and Professional learning	
Ongoing	Professional learning: CESE Publications - Anti-bullying Interventions in Schools - What Works?	
Term 2	Collect information & data about hotspots, types of behaviour and triggers.	
Ongoing	Regular and timely reminders to staff about active supervision and to visit playground ho spots regularly via weekly communication meetings.	
Ongoing	Reminder of BCS bullying procedure flowchart every term and annually review Anti-Bullying Plan.	

1.3 New and casual staff

New and casual staff will be informed about our school's approaches and strategies to prevent and respond to student bullying behaviour in the following ways:

Anti-bullying plan, bullying procedure flowchart and bullying statement recording sheet will be provided as part of the induction to Bulahdelah Central School for casual and new staff.

All staff to be directed to professional learning that is relevant to supporting student wellbeing and preventing and responding to bullying.

2 Partnerships with families and community

Effective schools have high levels of parental and community involvement. This involvement is strongly related to improved student learning, attendance and behaviour. Our school proactively builds collaborative relationships with families and communities to create a shared understanding of how to support student learning, safety and wellbeing.

2.1 Website

Our school website has information to support families help their children to regulate their emotions and behaviour and develop socially. Information is provided to assist if children have been involved in bullying behaviour (as the person engaging in bullying behaviour, as the person being bullied or as the person witnessing the bullying behaviour).

Ongoing	Provide information and advice to parents via school website, newsletter, Facebook, Sentral text messages and emails.	
Annually	P&C session on schools anti-bullying plan, bullying procedures and support documents.	
Term 1 annually	Publish updated Anti-Bullying Plan on website and have a hard copy stored in administration office.
