# **OUR PRINCIPAL'S REFLECTIONS:**

#### Parent Teacher Interviews – Year 7-11.

These are happening again tomorrow (Tuesday evening). As usual you need to have booked a time slot with your child's teacher. It is important that you allow time between interviews to enable you to get to the next teacher. This helps ensure that teachers remain on schedule. It also helps if you keep to the allocated time (5 minutes) as other parents are usually waiting to see the same teacher. If you need more time then it is best to organise another opportunity when the teacher and yourself aren't constrained by the booking system, such as after school on another day.

In some cases, parent-teacher interviews may not be very informative, especially if the teacher reports that the child has no problems. Some parents may repeatedly hear that they "have nothing to worry about". While this may sound reassuring, you may come away without the necessary information to help your child continue to make steady progress at school.

May I suggest that you come along with some questions that you might wish the teacher to answer? For students that appear to be going well and have little or no concerns the following questions (with thanks to the NT Council of Government School Organisations) might enlighten you and the resulting conversation may also help the teacher develop a better (and deeper) understanding of your child.

#### 1. What does my child do that surprises you?

Often this question can reveal what expectations the teacher has for the child. Sometimes a child behaves quite differently at school than at home.

#### 2. What is my child reluctant to do?

This question can reveal more about the child's interests and dislikes than parents would ordinarily know. The question may encourage the teacher to talk to the parent about the child's academic and social preferences.

**3. What is the goal you would like to see my child achieve?** This question can serve as a springboard for parents and teachers to develop a plan to work together to help a child set and reach specific outcomes. Even well behaved and high achieving children may benefit from setting goals in areas that need improvement or in which they might excel.

#### 4. What can I do to support what is being done at school?

This question is always appreciated. Teachers may have suggestions for parents but may be afraid to offer unsolicited advice. This question helps create a team feeling.

#### Evaluation of Stage 6 (Years 11/12)

The school is currently in the process of conducting a situational analysis to clearly identify the significant factors that influence the performance of our senior students. The situational analysis involves an assessment of the school's quantitative and qualitative data and will provide evidence on which to base future planning and decision making.

There has been a wide range of data collected and analysed with the team interviewing and surveying students, parents and staff to add to what we already had within the school. This has included attendance data for staff and students, subject selection material, assessment results including the school certificate and HSC.

The aggregation and synthesis of the data and information will allow the team to determine the most appropriate strategies to significantly improve learning outcomes, teaching and leadership practices at Bulahdelah Central School. It will also inform our decisions about future directions, key targets and strategies for the 2012-2015 School Strategic Plan.

I would like to thank all the students, parents and staff that gave up their time to take part in the process so far. Your honest feedback and responses have significantly helped shape the findings and recommendations from the process. I believe it is a very worthwhile and invaluable change tool.

## UPDATE FROM OUR SECONDARY DEPUTY PRINCIPAL:

I hope everyone had a relaxing and enjoyable holiday.

Term 3 commenced with a **staff development day** which focussed on building teacher skills in classroom management and developing our ability to use technology to enable students to access course information both at home and school using a moodle program. In addition a couple of parents spoke to the secondary staff about the challenges and rewards of raising children with autism. The secondary staff will be using the information and skills gained, to reflect on and develop their teaching during the rest of the term.

Last term we **elected our new captains, vice captains and SRC members**. Congratulations to all those elected and to all those students inducted into our new SRC. Mrs. Guthrie, Ms Gresham and myself will be working closely with these student leaders this term to develop leadership skills by initially attending a leadership training camp later in the term and later developing strategies for addressing issues such as bullying, improving student facilities and raising awareness of social justice as well as supporting people who are less fortunate than ourselves.

At the end of last term students from Years 7to 11 received their **semester 1 reports**. Hopefully parents have had the opportunity to digest the comments from their child's teachers and discussed these with their children.

This Tuesday evening parents and students are invited to a **parent teacher evening** commencing at 3:15pm in O block. This is a great opportunity to further discuss your child's report and their progress in each of their subjects with their teachers. Students have been issued with booking sheets to make appointments with each of their teachers to enable parents to maximise the time they can meet with all of the teachers on the night.

In addition parents of students in Years 8 and 10 will have the chance to attend an **information session** on electives and course options for 2012. It would be great to see all parents there, so you can be well informed about the choices your child will have to make for next year.

Finally next week is **Education Week** and there will be a number of activities and opportunities for both students and parents to participate and observe during the week. We are hoping to email and publish information for parents with a full program of activities later this week.

# **NEWS OF EX-STUDENTS**

In November, ex—school captain 1999 and recently retired paralympian **Heath Francis** will be heading with a group of friends to the Himalaya to trek for four weeks in the Solu Khumbu region of Nepal. Beneath the shadow of the world's mightiest peak, they will be ascending windswept ridges and crossing high passes at altitudes in excess of 5000m. The Solu Khumbu region is where the Australian Himalayan Foundation (AHF) runs its 'Quality Education' program which directly benefits 35,000 students in over 300 schools. The group is hoping to raise \$35,000 which is the amount needed to run this program for 12 months. They will have the chance to experience Nepal's Sherpa culture which is famous for its generosity and welcoming nature and the group members hope to repay that generosity by putting something back into this beautiful region and giving the children a chance to receive a quality education! Heath will be joined on this trek by School Dux 1999 **Jillian Lee** among others. **Australian Himalayan Foundation** is a not for profit organisation dedicated to helping the people of the Himalaya achieve their goals – through supporting and overseeing health, education and environmental projects in Nepal, India and Bhutan. # SCRIBBLINGS FROM THE SRC

On Tuesday 28th June 2011, the Student Representative Council held an out of uniform day to promote our Mobile Muster in support of YouCan, which is an initiative derived from the canteen projects to develop awareness and raise funds for teenagers fighting cancer. In 2010, Sony Foundation Australia, together with CanTeen, launched 'You Can', a national fundraising campaign to build youth cancer centres across Australia. You Can's major fundraising calls on all Australians to recycle their old mobile phones. Sony Foundation has partnered with an international recycling company to swap these phones for money. On the day we managed to muster 106 mobile phones and raised \$313.50 for this worthwhile cause. Our goal is to muster 500 mobile phones from school students, staff and the surrounding community. Why do we need youth cancer centres? One in 100 Australians is diagnosed with cancer before the age of 30. In the last 25 years there has been virtually no improvement in survival outcomes for the 15-30 age group. Cancer is the biggest disease killer of Australian teenagers In Australia your chances of surviving certain cancers decreases by 50% the day you turn 16. Currently in Australia, if you are diagnosed with cancer over the age of 16, you are treated in the adult health care system. Teenagers and young adults need specialised care in an age-appropriate environment.

#### MEDICARE TEEN DENTAL PLAN

To help keep your teenager's teeth in top shape, the Australian Government provides eligible teenagers with a voucher, valued up to \$159.85, to help with the cost of a preventative dental check. To be eligible your child must be entitled to Medicare benefits, be receiving certain government payments individually or as part of a family, and be aged 12–17 years, for at least part of the calendar year. If your child is in equal shared-care arrangements, the first family to claim the service with Medicare Australia will be entitled to the full benefit. The voucher expires on 31 December 2011. #### \*WHY DO WE PLAY THE CHRIS HOARE CUP?

BCS has many traditions, some established over many years, others not quite as old. One of the newer traditions is the annual contest of the **Chris Hoare Rugby League Cup** between Gloucester High & BCS. This has been played every year since 2004.

Chris Hoare was a student at Bulahdelah Central School from Kindergarten through to Year 12. Chris' parents, well-known local identities Steve & Jenny, were always very proud of Chris' achievements and gave great support in all his endeavours as did his younger brother Brenton. Chris was a capable and hardworking student who achieved to his potential academically and achieved his Higher School Certificate in 1994. He also took on various roles within the school by being a member of the Student Representative Council, participating in school musicals and fundraising activities.

However, it was at sport that Chris excelled. His potential was evident during his Primary school years when he was the Junior Boys



Athletic, Tennis & Swimming Champions. In secondary school he represented in athletics and cross country at Zone level and also in football. Chris competed in athletics, coming second in the 15 Years Boys' Triple Jump at the Hunter Region Secondary Schools Sports Association while achieving school awards in all age sections for Javelin, Discus, Shot Put, Long Jump and High Jump, Hurdles, 100m, 200m, 400m and 800m races.

In 1993 while in Year 11 Chris was selected to the Manning Zone Open Rugby League Team and continued his school sporting achievements by being the 17 Years Boy Athletics Champion as well as the School Sportsman of the Year. Chris was equally adept at swimming, achieving in freestyle, breaststroke and medley races. In 1994, as a Year 12 student, Chris was Hunter Region representative in the Open Rugby League team. Other sporting achievements include competing in the Bulahdelah King of the Mountain triathlon and endurance race (1983 & 1984) which he successfully completed, both times being the youngest to finish. His Indoor Cricket Team won the Winter Competition and he was Under 16 Years Taree Old Bar "Best Back "in 1992. Due to his sporting expertise and his popularity with his peers, Chris was elected as captain of his Sporting House, Bradman, and a role he relished.

Under the headline of "Big Future for Local Footballer" in a local newspaper, it was announced that a young Bulahdelah footballer had been picked to play against Queensland and Western Australia. Chris Hoare, a member of the Under 18 Rugby League team which regularly played in the Tea Gardens/Hawks Nest-Bulahdelah area each week was picked to play with the Newcastle Under 18 representative squad against Queensland Under 18 at Lang Park before the third test against New Zealand in 1993. During this match he scored the winning try for Newcastle. Following that match Chris was picked to play in the Under 17 Newcastle representative squad to play against Western Australia on 17<sup>th</sup> July, 1993. In 1994 he played in the Under 19 Country Championship at Coffs Harbour and in September 1994 Chris received confirmation of his selection in the Newcastle Knights Jersey Flegg Summer Training Squad.

Chris was born in February, 1976 and tragically died in a car accident on 27th December, 1996.

BCS decided, under the guidance of teacher Damien Keen, to celebrate Chris' achievements by playing matches in the Under 14 and Open Team categories against Gloucester High School each year

The inaugural match was played on 20<sup>th</sup> May 2004, refereed by Bill Harrigan, well known former referee and current head of referring for the National Rugby League.
