World Teachers' Day

Last Friday (25th October) was the day Australia celebrates World Teachers' Day, which acknowledges the skills, knowledge and expertise of teachers in an increasingly complex society. World Teachers' Day has been held annually on October 5th since 1994 - when it was created by UNESCO but in Australia the date was moved to fit in with our school terms and is celebrated on the last Friday of October each year. Its aim is to mobilise support for teachers and to ensure that the needs of future generations will continue to be met by teachers.

There is no doubt that NSW teachers are world-class educators and World Teachers' Day provides the opportunity to acknowledge the professionalism of teachers and the invaluable contribution they make to the future of our society.

The transformative power of a teacher is something almost all of us have experienced and understand on a personal level but these people generally go unrecognised in their remarkable work with students on a daily basis. Teachers can have an enriching effect on the daily lives of children and their lifelong educational and career aspirations.

I am very proud to be a member of a profession that can change lives for children and young people by providing opportunities for the future and the contribution teachers are making to our current generation of learners.

The new Resource Allocation Model (RAM)

In 2012, the NSW Government announced its Local Schools, Local Decisions (LSLD) reform for NSW public schools.

This reform places students at the centre of school decision making and it gives principals and school communities a greater say over how they allocate and use the available resources to best meet the needs of their students.

The RAM is designed to achieve a simpler, fairer and more transparent distribution of government school funding and change the way resources (Staff and Finances) are managed in our school system.

The RAM provides many benefits to schools by:

- Allocating most funding on a per student basis.
- Ensuring funding is provided to schools based on the characteristics of those schools and the students within them. This will result in additional schools receiving funding to support students with identified needs. In addition, schools identified as having students with the highest need will be funded at a higher rate.
- Reducing big changes in a school's resources, e.g. losing a teacher or admin staff member, which can accompany small changes in the reduction in enrolments. Under the current system, a small change in circumstances can mean a school drops out of a program and loses a significant amount, or a whole teacher or school executive position.
- Providing increased funding that goes directly to schools. This will make school planning easier from year to year.
- Shifting from the current funding model where schools manage 10% of the total public school education budget to more than 70% being managed by schools.
- Allowing for more flexibility, innovation and decision-making in schools to meet student needs.

In 2014, all schools will receive funding based on the first two components of the RAM: the targeted (individual student) funding and the equity funds (low level adjustment for disability, Aboriginal background, English language proficiency and socio-economic background). For Bulahdelah Central School this will see a significant increase in our funding allowing us to put in place additional programs to meet the needs of our students.


“But I want to do Harry Potter,” throws in Megan. We all growl or laugh. She is silent but resolute.

“Well what about the costumes, they’d be too expensive,” I argue.


“No Miss, we can all wear onesies!”



STOP PRESS: WE ARE THE CHAMPIONS.....AGAIN!

Yes folks, our debating team comprising Chyna Smith, Hayley Chalker, Anjoli Luxon and Marni Barry (featured on the front page) have won the Lower North Coast Round Robin Debating competition for 2013. This is the 2nd consecutive year that Bulahdelah have taken out the title from Old Bar. I did not get to see the whole debate, but from all accounts it was a very close contest, with both teams delivering some very strong arguments to support their case. Congratulations girls and thank you Mrs Wills for your excellent coaching. We are all very proud of your efforts!

There have been a number of reported cases of head lice already this term. The following is taken from the NSW Health Government website: Head lice are only found on the human head or hair. Head lice do not live on furniture, hats, bedding, carpet or anywhere else in the environment. Treating anything other than the human head does not eradicate head lice.

Before you choose a treatment for head lice, consider the following:

- Make sure that the heads you treat are infested with head lice, otherwise do not treat them.
- Avoid treating babies for head lice or any scalp that is irritated or inflamed.
- Protect children's eyes when treating with any product.
- There is no preventative treatment available for head lice. Treating the whole family as a precaution contributes to head lice becoming resistant to the products used.
- Read the product label before applying and use as directed.
- Avoid using natural products like tea tree oil as treatment for head lice.

- Apply product and leave it for 20 minutes. Comb out with a good quality lice comb.
 - If dead lice are found, that means the product has worked. Retreat in 7 days to kill the nymphs that emerged from unhatched eggs.
 - If you find live lice, which means treatment hasn't worked, use another product or try the comb and conditioner method.
- Reduce transmission of head lice by tying hair back or braiding and by checking your children's hair.
- Keeping a good quality head lice comb in the shower should help anyone taking a shower to use the comb.
 - Do not use insecticides, methylated spirits or kerosene on your child's head.


The 9 hole junior tournament starts at **9.00am** with only 40 positions available. \$10 per player.

Intention to apply: Year 7 entry into selective high schools in 2015

Dear Parent/Carer

Government schools use a range of strategies to meet the educational needs of gifted and talented students. One strategy is selective high school placement which provides intellectual stimulation and an educationally enriched environment for gifted and talented students.

Offers for selective high school placement will be determined mainly on the basis of the Selective High School Placement Test results and school assessment. The Selective High School Placement Test will be held on Thursday 13 March 2014.

If you would like your child to apply for selective high school placement in Year 7 in 2015, you need to do so soon.

Most applicants are expected to apply on the internet and submit their application online. They will need to have an email address (not the student's email address), access to the internet and a printer.

Detailed instructions on how to apply online will be available from 15 October 2013 at www.schools.nsw.edu.au/shsplacement. Online applications close on 18 November 2013.

If parents do not have internet access, commercially printed application forms become available from the school on 22 October 2013. They must be completed and returned to the school by 18 November 2013.

The applications will be processed by the school in exactly the same way whether parents apply online or submit a commercially printed form. Parents are to submit only **ONE** application for each student.


