#### **Parent Online Payments**

Early next year a new parent payment option will be available through our website. This payment system is secure and specific to schools and is accessed using the Westpac QuickWeb system.

A **\$ Make a payment** link will be placed on the front page of our school's website. By selecting the **\$ Make a payment** link you will be taken to a secure Westpac QuickWeb payment page. You will no longer be in the school's website as this payment page is completely separate from the school and is run by Westpac as part of the banking service provided to all NSW government schools.

There will be no passwords or PINs to remember with the payment process very intuitive and follows the format of many other online payments that people use every day.

Payments can only be made using Visa or MasterCard credit or debit cards.

American Express, Diners Club or EFTPOS cards are not accepted. PayPal is not a payment option using this process either. If a payer only has an EFTPOS debit card then the school's EFTPOS terminal, cash or cheque are alternate methods of payment which will need to be made at the Front Office.

I believe this option will allow lots of our parents to make payments for such things as subject contributions, excursions, sport and equipment from home or work rather than having to come into school.

#### **End of Year Student Reports**



A heartfelt thank you to all of our sponsors for acknowledging and encouraging our youth.



Tuesday, 24<sup>th</sup> November, students in Years 3-6, were lucky enough to receive a visit from the State Library of New South Wales. The 'Far Out' learning program travels to towns in regional NSW to display and talk about original items relating to early Australian history.

Our students travelled back in time and experienced the life of Captain Cook, saw some of the navigational instruments that would have been used aboard the Endeavour and Captain Cook's shoe buckle that he wore during special occasions.

They also learnt about the life of Mary Reilly and saw the original letter she wrote as she waited aboard a ship to come ashore at Botany Bay.

Some of the other original sources that the students were lucky enough to see were original drawings from Johnny Kangatong from 1855 and Indigenous word lists from our local area dating back to 1885.

- Saint George won their tenth straight grand final.
- Record floods hit the Myall River in July of that year.
- Elvis Presley and the Beatles were still in full swing.
