Those students I spoke with certainly indicated that they appreciated the additional time with their teachers and the fact they could access them at various times during the holidays.



The Senior Vertical Curriculum

Just a reminder to our parents and community, the school is introducing the Senior Vertical Curriculum in Week 6 this term (Monday 14th November).

Information was provided in the 16th May issue of the BCS newsletter and an update on the impact on Years 7-9 in the 25th June issue. Part of the impact is the moving forward of the end of course examination and assessments. Many of these will happen over the coming weeks prior to the changeover periods. Reports will also be distributed earlier than usual for Years 7-10. Information will go up on our website this week for those people who are interested in the reasons behind the Senior Vertical Curriculum and the impact this will have on the school.

My Big Tomorrow – A valuable Career Information Website

My Big Tomorrow is a resource designed to help young Australians realise bigger life choices. After extensive consultation with high school students, it was determined that there was a lack of useful resources available to help them understand career choices. *My Big Tomorrow* was created to fill that void with inspiration, information and education.

Within the site students and family members are able to find extensive information on careers which the creators hope will inspire young people to think more broadly about their future careers. It is also designed to give them the understanding of the skills they will need in order to succeed in their chosen career. Students can discover their dream career, experience a day in the life of someone doing that job and find out how they got there.

For family members, *My Big Tomorrow* is a platform for better career discussions, helping you to work with your child to achieve their big tomorrow.

For educators, *My Big Tomorrow* has practical lesson plans and resources for your students, based on the Stage 5 curriculum.

My Big Tomorrow was developed by the Centre of Excellence for Equity in Higher Education at the University of Newcastle and funded by the Commonwealth's Higher Education Participation and Partnership Program (HEPPP). The Centre of Excellence for Equity in Higher Education is a multi-disciplinary and practice-orientated research hub. Please visit the site and share it with your child. I believe they will get some very valuable advice and find it a very worthwhile experience. Year 12 Music students sat their HSC Aural Skills Examination last Thursday afternoon. The one hour exam required the young musicians to listen to four pieces of music and write a response based on the concepts they had studied in class over the past two years. The music played in the exam was designed to test the students' knowledge and listening skills across a wide range of musical styles. Our students enjoyed the listening exam and all gave their best effort on the day.

Last week's Music Examination accounts for 30% of the student's final HSC mark for this subject. The practical examination held at the end of last term makes up the rest of their result.





REL. DEPUTY PRINCIPAL:

Playground Signage

Students will have noticed some changes to the playground areas over the holidays, specifically the

administration building courtyard, canteen, library, secondary COLA, Gym COLA and courts. New signs have been erected to remind students of the expected positive behaviours in each particular area. The building posts in each area have also been painted with a band of a particular colour to designate if the area is a *passive*, *mixed* or active area. Yellow band means this is a *passive* area, no ball games and no running. Sky blue means that this area is a mixed area, handball is permitted to be played in the open areas and students are to sit at the tables respectfully. Green bands indicate the courts active area, ball games such as basketball, soccer or touch football is permitted and no food or drink is to be consumed on the courts.

These signs and the colour post band markings are a part of the BCS Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) program. They will assist students to demonstrate, and staff to monitor, the desired playground behaviours in each particular area.



The next step for the PBL team will be accessing various forms of student data to implement specific PBL actions for specific student cohort groups in response to the data collected.

Hard Work, Determination and Perseverance Will Be Rewarded

In 2016 we have been very fortunate to witness several examples in the world of sport which prove the above to be true. We saw Leicester City finally win the English Premier League title after 132 years in this competition. During the school holidays we have seen the Western Bulldogs AFL (Australian Football League) team become premiers for the first time in 62 years and the Cronulla Sharks NRL (National Rugby League) team become premiers for the first time in that club's 50 year history. So what is the message for students from all of this? I'm sure you have your own opinion but from my perspective these events have shown that hard work, determination, patience and the courage to be brave when it matters do give you the chance of achieving things that are important to you in life.

HEAD LICE TREATMENT FREE TRIAL:



How does Licener work? Licener works in a single treatment in just 10 minutes. The active ingredient in Licener is the natural Neem-extract, originating from the Neem tree.
