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Science and Engineering Challenge On Tuesday, 8th of May 2018 the Year 5/6 class went to the Taree Racecourse for the Science and Engineering Challenge. The following is a report from some students who attended.

"The first thing we had to do when we got there was meet our team mates from Elands Public School. We got into our school groups and sat down while the Coordinator told us what the Science and Engineering Challenge was all about. There were eight activities that our school had to complete throughout the day.

Our team was a yellow group and our first activity was Mars Rover. Mars Rover was an activity where you had to build a buggy out of bolts, a piece of rectangle wood and a little square block with grips on both sides to hold the test block. The aim was to pull your buggy with string across red bumps that started little and got bigger with a block on top that you couldn't secure in any way.



After this activity we had a quick lunch break. Lunch was a sausage sizzle cooked by the lovely Lions Club volunteers.

When we finished lunch we went to our next activity String-Along consisting of two lengths of string a board with 82 bolts which have towns and black lines between them which are pathways.

There were six different scenarios. The aim of this activity was to connect the towns and cities (bolts) in the most efficient network possible. The shorter the string used (distance), the more points your team earns. In the end we had 1428 points. We learnt that if you miss some you end up with a lot more string at the end.



After String-Along we went back into the meeting place where we watched a Science demonstration. It was fun to watch the foam rockets and sodium bicarbonate fizzing rockets.

The day finished up with the bridge testing which was really exciting. They finally announced the places of the schools and how excited we all were to find out Bulahdelah Central had won. We were so happy!" Izabell Read and Elise Miles

### **REL. PRINCIPAL'S REPORT:**

Term 2 is well and truly underway and quickly filling with events for our staff and students.

Unfortunately, following a couple of recent events, I do need to start my article with a reminder to all parents about the need to make appointments with staff if they wish to discuss their child's behaviour or progress. It is important that all members of each child's educational partnership have the opportunity to contribute to discussions regarding the student's needs and learning goals, and this does need to be done in a respectful manner. Making an appointment with the staff member does indicate that parents respect the teacher's timetabled lessons and duties. Given that this is the teachers' workplace, and the site contains some 400 students, abusive and offensive language will not be tolerated. For our efforts to make the school grounds a safe and enjoyable area for students, staff and guests, focussed on student learning, it is important that we do not have unauthorised people on the school site at any time. I require that any parent, carers, ex-students or friends report to the front office and complete the relevant checks for their purpose of being at the school. I understand that Primary students' parents will often come into the Primary area to drop off or pick up their child/ren and this is fine, but please do not be offended if a teacher asks you to make an appointment rather than you 'catching them while they are there'.

We are currently working our way through the annual NAPLAN (National Assessment Program Literacy & Numeracy) testing for Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 with a difference this year, as we are completing the majority of the testing online. A huge thank you to Mr Jones for the training of staff and the organisation of this event throughout the school.

It is hoped that the opportunity of completing NAPLAN online will provide us with the data regarding the students' performance quicker so that staff can analyse and utilise the information for our students in a more responsive way. I am currently working with the great staff at the Bendigo Bank to introduce weekly banking back into the school. Students from K-12 (with the help of their parents) will have the opportunity to open an account at the school on the Monday afternoon of the 28<sup>th</sup> May and then will be able to make deposits each week, learning the financial literacy surrounding saving, budgeting and managing an account.

This term will see the start of our short courses in the school which will run after hours for 5 weeks or on the weekend of the  $2^{nd}$  and  $3^{rd}$  June. This initiative is a part of our 2018 - 2020 School Plan and supported by our P&C. I would like to thank our community for their enthusiasm, particularly the people stepping up as presenters, evident by the offering of 15 courses. Being a new concept and gauging the needs of our local community, we have been able to run a small number of these courses in the initial round. It is hoped the variety of courses and participation rates increase for our Term 4 offering.

With our P&C growing in numbers, we have had a number of new ideas for fundraising. At present they are planning a "Colour Run" on the 29th June, a warehouse shopping trip on 21st October and a Christmas toy catalogue to be distributed for orders. This is in addition to the traditional Mothers' Day and Fathers' Day stall and Easter raffles. If you have some other ideas or want to hear what is happening at the school, please join us at the next meeting on Wednesday, 13th June at 3:45pm.

I would also like to remind parents the rules regarding pickup and drop off of students at school. Please be mindful of the offences related to School Zones and most importantly the safety of all our children. *Deb Gilbert*

## Mrs Elizabeth (Betty) Bramble 1932 to 2015

Let's go to the beginning. Miss Elizabeth Faulkner grew up as part of a hard working family on their dairy farm near Casino. She left the farm during her high school

years to board in Armidale to finish this part of her education. Teachers College followed and then an appointment to be a teacher at Lakemba in Sydney. But, before she began this position, a small event changed the direction of her life.

Mrs Bramble had a college friend who was in tears because she was being sent to a tiny school in a place called Bungwahl. Mrs Bramble had grown up in a little country school herself and she told her she was sure she'd like it – but she only cried all the harder. The end result of the conversation was that Mrs Bramble "swapped" her city posting for the one in Bungwahl – which, as far as she knew, was somewhere between Taree and Newcastle.

So on Australia Day, 1952, she arrived at Bungwahl. She loved it straight away. Bungwahl was a fishing and timber town, and had a thriving social life along with nearby centres like Wootton and Bulahdelah. Two years after her arrival she married her late husband Colin Bramble, and resided in the area for the rest of her years.

Since that first appointment to Bungwahl, Mrs Bramble has taught at many schools in the area including two stints at Bulahdelah Central – the first as a classroom teacher in the late 1960s, early 1970s and the second as Assistant Principal in the 1980s, and fortunately for all of us, Mrs Bramble held those times very close to her heart.



Mrs Bramble was loved by everyone in Bulahdelah - pupils, parents, community members and fellow teachers. One great story, recalled by Kay Smith, was about some primary boys playing cricket at lunchtime. A little 7 year old boy bravely stood at the crease with a big cricket bat in hand. A bigger boy bowled a fast ball straight at the little boy. He swung, he missed and the cricket ball hit him in a very delicate spot. The little boy buckled at the knees and cried and cried. The male teacher on playground duty rushed over and said to the little boy, "I must have a look and make sure there is no blood and no damage done". The little boy absolutely refused to show him his wounded area. The male teacher said, "We must have it checked out. Who will you show?" The little boy stood up and said, "I will show Mrs Bramble". So, Mrs Bramble had a look, and pronounced all was in good condition but did admit many years afterwards that she was relieved when, 25 years later, the boy married and had a family.

Mrs Bramble was absolutely dedicated to education. When she lived in her home on the shore of Smiths Lake there was a watercourse between the house and the Seal Rocks Road. This water course was normally dry but in times of heavy rain it would flood. Did Mrs Bramble stay home from school? No, she parked her car on the road side of the watercourse, walked from her house, waded through the deep water and then changed clothes and drove to school. This level of dedication never left her. She attended most of our special assemblies; she served on our School Council for many years and was a valued member of the P&C for many, many years.

- Bungwahl Primary School debating coach
- Pacific Palms Primary School reading program
- Mentor to students at Forster High School
- Supported trainee teachers through the University of Newcastle
- Member of the U3A (catering for mature learners) at Forster
- Life member of Bulahdelah Show Society and co-ordinator of the Young Achiever competition and writing competition and judge of the Show public speaking competition.
- Member of Bulahdelah Historical Society
- Member of Bulahdelah ANZAC Centenary Commemoration Volunteers

#### Her many awards were:

- 1994 Hunter Region Award from the Department of Education
- 1996 The Director General's Award for her services to education. She was an official "Ambassador for Education" under a scheme to promote public education.
- 1999 OAM (Order of Australia Medal) for her enormous contribution to both education and her community.



Mrs Bramble breathed into each one of us loyalty, affection, selfdiscipline and love of learning and community. When you talked to anyone who knew her, the person always tells a story about her with a big grin on their face – a true reflection of the genuine warm feelings everyone had and will continue to have for her.

# DEPUTY PRINCIPAL INSTRUCTIONAL LEADER:

## Comprehension - A Key to Learning Success Part 1

Over the past couple of weeks, I have had the pleasure of working with students from Mr Gibb's Year 1/2 class on a strategy known as Reciprocal Reading. This strategy utilises independent readers to build and develop their comprehension skills through the ability to predict, compare, link, clarify, discuss, summarise and question both fiction and non-fiction books and articles that they have read. This strategy will ultimately assist these students to independently comprehend all kinds of information including graphs, data, illustrations, texts, poetry and internet information. And let's face it, with the unlimited amount of information out there, the ability to comprehend is more crucial than ever.

As students progress through Primary and into High school, they face a whole new set of comprehension challenges that can be difficult even for students who 'read well'. Every subject relies on students having the ability to understand what they're reading and then use the information in a certain way.

As work becomes more complex in secondary school and students are expected to be more independent, the nature of reading changes significantly and comprehension becomes more challenging. Depending on what the subject is and why the student is reading it, they will need to use a range of new strategies to comprehend the information and use it properly. By asking, 'are they simply skimming through research information', for example, clues of whether it's going to help them with their history assignment? Or are they carefully reading poetry and need to be looking for literary devices like alliteration and metaphors? Or reading a set of construction rules. Different subjects require very different strategies.

What do 'good readers' have in common? Have you ever read a paragraph of a book and thought, "Wait, that doesn't make sense."? You probably went back, and reread the section, more slowly and carefully the second time. You may have flipped back to the index page to see if you missed an important chapter or to see if it's explained in more detail later on in the book. It's important we tell our children that being a good reader isn't about speed or getting all the words right the first time. Good reading is knowing when you have to stop and try different things to help you understand the text.

There are three things you can do right now as parents:

**1** Ask your child to explain the text to you.

**2** Ask them questions (preferably those where they will need to elaborate- not just yes or no).

**3** Wait. Take a breath, and let them answer in their own time. *Debbie Booth*
