

REL. PRINCIPAL'S REPORT:

Welcome to Term 3.

This term is always filled with the reality of the upcoming HSC exams and major works for our senior students and their teachers. It is

certainly the time to make use of every lesson and opportunity provided by the school, demonstrating the importance of attendance. Our senior students should also be utilising a timetabled study program outside of school to ensure all assessment tasks are completed on time and to avoid the last minute cramming sessions. It is also important to have a balance to their studies, so our students are encouraged to have social, family and personal time. Research shows that exercise and diet are also important. Jenny Mooney (Everitt)
I began teaching at
Macksville High School in the
mid-70's and, after a rash
decision to move to
Melbourne (considering the
climate), I returned to Sydney
and worked for the NSW
Teachers Credit Union for a
number of years.

After two babies and a move to Tea Gardens, I started work at Bulahdelah Central as a casual teacher in 1990. My earliest memory of BCS is of sitting in the English staffroom and gazing up at the Alum Mountain, thinking how lucky I was to have found a job in such a beautiful place. It was a fairly nomadic existence, being an English teacher there, though. I think we moved staff rooms at least six times until we finally settled into the old Library.

We were a good team and worked together well. Being the oldest, I had the title of Grammar Queen, having been at school myself in the dark ages when grammar was part of what you studied.

The students, on the whole, were a delight to teach. There was generally a bit of a slump in motivation in Years 8 and 9, but nothing too serious. There were a lot of very talented students and the senior classes were keen to succeed.

However, my favourite classes (after the seniors) were the Year 10 boys, whom I had as a group for three years in a row. A lot of them battled with English skills, but we got there by the end of each year. One year I had them for the first lesson each Monday morning. This was unfortunate timetabling as they had invariably put in a big weekend and there were usually a few heads on desks as they slept off the parties.

They were also unexpectedly gallant. When one of them let fly with some four letter words, he was

reminded by one of his mates that "This is English, not Ag. No swearing in English".

Being a Central school, we had more to do with Primary students than you would in a high school. I was in awe of what the Primary teachers achieved (I still am), even more so when someone came up with the idea of a playground duty shared roster, with some Primary staff doing duty in the Secondary areas and vice versa. My first duty in the Primary playground was an eye-opener. One little poppet came up to me sobbing. When I asked what was wrong, she pointed furiously at another student and said, "She's looking at me." At the end of my duty I went to the Office and asked to be transferred back to the 'big school' roster.

I hope Shane Nunan doesn't mind me sharing this Primary story. Shane has a beard and long hair. He is also of stately proportions. Apparently a Primary student had been up to the Secondary area and saw Shane on playground duty. She reported back with great excitement that she had found where Santa works outside Christmas. "He's in the big school!"

Of course school was more than the classroom and the playground. I loved Bushwalking for sport, with Alum Mountain being the perfect place to go. The smokers in the group always volunteered to go first as scouts for us slower walkers. They thought we didn't know their true motivation.

Swimming and athletics carnivals were a welcome break from routine and the "Horizons" weeks were fabulous.

The office and ancillary staff were always helpful. Irene Worth was a model of patience first thing in the morning when she was flooded with staff needing something photocopied urgently for the start of the day. The Library was a welcome refuge for kids who were having trouble finding friends in the playground and I know the Library staff were very kind to them. They would eventually find their feet and make their way 'outside'.

Staff meetings are a part of school life, but still tedious. We spent a few meetings playing a surreptitious variation of Bingo, with points gained by being the first to spot use of the latest education jargon, such as; Paradigm, Cohort, Engaged, KLA, Empower, Innovative, Transformative, Benchmark. You get the idea.

These terms could be strung together in sentences which left some of us mystified. However the meeting would go on and you just prayed that when the inevitable question came up, "Does anyone have anything further to add?" that no one did.

Bulahdelah is a pretty town and the people were friendly and welcoming. I had a standing order each week to take some of the high-top loaves from the bakery back to Tea Gardens.

I was sad to leave BCS and the friends I made there. Between all the staff we taught a lot of students and trained a few Head Teachers along the way.

Thank you, Bulahdelah Central School. You gave me a wonderful place to teach and some very happy memories. All the best in the future.



DEPUTY PRINCIPAL INSTRUCTIONAL LEADER:

What's the Sense in a Number? (Part 2)

I'm just wondering if I gave you another number this week how you would go with number sense, now you know what it's all about. Do you think you will improve? Talking about numbers is a great way to build number sense with your children.

As already stated in the previous newsletter, number sense develops when students begin to connect numbers to their own real life experiences. When students use friendly numbers (like numbers that end in zero, such as 10, 30 and 100) or numbers that they are familiar with (e.g. 27 is almost 25), this helps them understand how numbers relate to one another. This results in students who are confident that they can make sense of mathematics.

Students with a number sense know what 10 is in a variety of situations, including how 6 and 4 or 7 and 3 make 10, or how 10 can look like:

* * * * * or * # * # * # * # * #

They start to make connections, e.g. if 6+4=10 then 60+40=100, etc.

This term, teachers from K-6 will be promoting number sense in their classrooms daily and encouraging their students to make connections to their own experiences and their previous learning. So watch this space for some student's work samples.

We will also be running a mathematics workshop for parents one afternoon after school, which everyone will be welcome to attend.

How You Can Help Your Child at Home

If your child is struggling with number-sense skills, there are ways you can help them build understanding.

It's a good idea to start with the basics.

- Practice counting and grouping objects then add to, subtract from or divide the groups into smaller groups to practice operations. You can also combine groups to show multiplication. Try matching numerals with quantities of objects, too.
- Work on estimating. Build questions into each day conversations, using phrases like "About how many" or "About how much."
- Discuss relationships among quantities. Ask your child to use words like more and less to compare things e.g. how many chips in this snack pack?
- Build in opportunities to discuss things like time and money. For example, you could ask your child to keep track of how long it takes to drive or walk to the grocery store. Then, compare it to how long it takes to get to his school. Ask which takes longer.
- Understand patterns in the world around us and make predictions based on patterns (for example, predict traffic patterns to decide on the best time to travel).
- Solve problems and make sound decisions.
- Explain how we solved a problem and why we made a particular decision.
- **Use technology** (for example, calculators and computers) to help solve problems.
- Play board games like Monopoly.

Now go ahead and try your number sense with 35 and 790. Send your answers into Mrs Booth's office for publishing! Don't forget to ask your children to help you even those in Kindergarten may tell you if you are 35 you are old, their




Borrowing/Returns. Parents/Carers could you please make sure that your children return their library book on Wednesday/Thursday of each week. The due date of each library book is stamped in the back of the book. Students may also return and borrow books in lunchtimes every day except Thursday.

Library Bags. We would also like to encourage each Primary student to have a library bag. This helps to protect the books from food and drink spills in bags and also helps to minimise the loss of books both at school and home.

If your child does not have a Library bag, the Library can organise a bag for them.

Scholastic Book /LOOP Orders. Catalogues for Scholastic come out twice a term. The due date for these orders is stamped on the front of the catalogue and is also advertised in the newsletter. Student orders enable Bulahdelah Central to earn 20% of all sales in reward points which are then used to purchase new resources for the library.
