PRINCIPAL'S REPORT:

Remembrance Day

I would like to acknowledge the students and staff of Bulahdelah Central School who organised and presented our special school

assembly honouring Remembrance Day.

Remembrance Day this year had special significance. Sunday, 11th November 2018 marked the 100th anniversary of the Armistice which ended the First World War (1914–18).

One hundred years ago, on 11th November 1918, the guns of the Western Front fell silent after four years of continuous warfare. With their armies retreating and close to collapse, German leaders signed an Armistice, bringing to an end the First World War. From the summer of 1918, the five divisions of the Australian Corps had been at the forefront of the allied advance to victory.

Beginning with their stunning success at the battle of Hamel in July, they helped to turn the tide of the war at Amiens in August, followed by the capture of Mont St Quentin and Pèronne, and the breaching of German defences at the Hindenburg Line in September. By early October the exhausted Australians were withdrawn from battle. They had achieved a fighting reputation out of proportion to their numbers, but victory had come at a heavy cost. They suffered almost 48,000 casualties during 1918, including more than 12,000 dead.

In the four years of the war more than 330,000 Australians had served overseas, and more than 60,000 of them had died. The social effects of these losses cast a long shadow over the post-war decades.

The red poppy has a special significance for Australians. Australians wear a Red Poppy on Remembrance Day for three reasons. Firstly, in memory of the sacred dead who rest in Flanders Fields. Secondly, to keep alive the memories of the sacred cause for which they laid down their lives. Thirdly, as a bond of esteem and affection between the soldiers of all Allied nations and in respect for France, our common battleground.

Worn on Remembrance Day each year, the red poppies were among the first to flower in the devastated battlefields of northern France and Belgium in the First World War. In soldiers' folklore, the vivid red of the poppy came from the blood of their comrades soaking the ground. *George Frangos*

Poetry

As we recognised the one hundredth anniversary of Remembrance Day last weekend, I thought about one of the most famous and recognised poems in the world, Laurence Binyon's *"The Fallen"*, from which is taken our Ode that we recite each ANZAC and Remembrance Day – ending with those very simple, but poignant words, *"Lest We Forget."*

In 1914, Laurence Binyon had sat on a cliff in North Cornwall, England. It was less than seven weeks after the outbreak of World War One, with British casualties mounting fast. Long lists of the dead and wounded were appearing in British newspapers. The British Expeditionary Force was in retreat from Mons, and the previous promise of a speedy end to the war fading fast. Against this backdrop Binyon, then Assistant Keeper of Prints and Drawings at the British Museum, sat to compose his poem that Rudyard Kipling would one day praise as *"the most beautiful expression of sorrow in the English language"*.

This made me think about the importance of poetry in our children's learning and how often this importance is overlooked. Even before students come to school, reading and reciting nursery rhymes is a way of developing and understanding about the way words are expressed in writing, rather than the way they are spoken. Listening and reciting these rhymes also develops phonemic awareness, i.e. the ability to hear sounds in words, identify rhyming words, etc. Skills which assist children to incidentally develop their reading and writing skills. It also provides an opportunity to feel the rhythm and beat, which in turn builds musicality within.

Poetry is important because it can cross boundaries that other writing cannot do. Poetry can allow our students to paint sketches of their lives. They use their imagination and symbolic language, often describing painful experiences or parts of themselves they are not yet ready to share. It allows our students to break the rules along the way, e.g. no capitalisation, grammar or punctuation.

Poetry can assist building resilience in children and adults by fostering our social and emotional learning. A well-crafted phrase or two in a poem can help us see an experience in an entirely new way. It can assist us to find ways to discuss the difficult and unexplainable things in life – death, suffering and even profound joy and transformation. It is the basis of all our favourite songs we love to sing along with.

Recently I had the opportunity to visit Ms Connell and Year 9B. They had been studying and discussing many different forms of poetry. On the day of my visit, it was their turn to become poets. On reading some of the poetry they had written I felt many different emotions, ranging from pure joy to sadness to delight. So here are a couple of their poems that displays, 'language powerful enough to say how it is. They are poems that aren't hiding places, but rather finding places.' I hope you enjoy them as much as I did.
