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#### **PRINCIPAL'S REPORT:**

Attendance and absences Parents/Carers must ensure their children attend school every day.

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- Being sick or having an infectious disease.
- Having an unavoidable medical appointment.
- Exceptional or urgent family circumstances, e.g. attending a funeral.

Parents/Carers must provide an explanation for absences to the school within 7 days from the first day of any period of absence. Where an explanation has not been received within the 7-day time frame, the school will record the absence as unjustified on the student's record.

#### **School Uniform**

At Bulahdelah Central School our school uniform is very important and students wear it with PRIDE. It was interesting speaking to students about their thoughts about wearing a school uniform. Some of the responses included: "*it's convenient, you don't have to worry about what to wear*", "*it identifies you have PRIDE in yourself and the school*", "*you are not judged by what you wear*".

What are the benefits of school uniforms? They are:

- Defining an identity for the school within its community.
- Developing students' sense of belonging to the school community.
- Providing an opportunity to build school spirit.
- Enhancing the health and safety of students when involved in school activities.

- Reinforcing the awareness of the school as an ordered and safe environment.
- Increasing the personal safety of students and staff by allowing easier recognition of visitors and potential intruders in the school.

**Lilly Brown, Year 11**, reconfirmed her place amongst Australia's top shooters after finishing second in the junior section of the National Single Action Shooting Championships recently held in Queensland.

Dressed in period clothing, the sharp-shooting Year 11 student who competes under the alias of 'Lethal Lilly', used a pistol, lever action rifle and a double barrel shotgun to knockdown 24 targets in each of the 12 Wild West themed stages in the competition. The overall winner was determined by speed and accuracy.

Lilly had 6 clean rounds, shooting all targets in the stages in the correct sequence. Her times were also impressive, taking just 30 seconds to shoot her best round.

Lilly is a member of the Gloucester Rifle Club and became involved in the sport many years ago after watching her father compete. She has since won numerous state and national titles including the CASS (Cowboy Action Shooting Society) Australian Shooter of the Year Award in 2015.

The NDIS supports people with disability to build skills and capability so they can participate in the community and employment.

The NDIS helps people with disability to:

- Access mainstream services and supports.

- Maintain informal support arrangements.
- Receive reasonable and necessary funded supports.

Importance of Practical Skills Over the past fortnight I have had the opportunity of visiting various Year

7 to 12 classes and I was most interested when I stopped in to see Year 7 completing a woodworking task with Mr Gladys. It was wonderful to see a mixture of male and female students working alongside each other, sanding, cutting, gluing, measuring and listening to the conversation of students engaged in their task. Whilst I am not that aged, I wished that I had had the opportunity to participate in practical woodworking tasks when I was at school, but alas 'back in my day' only girls did sewing and cooking and boys did woodwork, metalwork and technical design.

It got me thinking about how important these practical skills are in assisting to prepare our students for life beyond the school gate. It also allows students to apply their theoretical knowledge from other key learning areas to these more practical tasks. It also showed me how students take pride in their finished products and that sense of achievement.

Many top educational researchers believe that our students are generally sent into the world with plenty of education. Unfortunately most students have a lack of practical knowledge to help them navigate everyday life. As Technological and Applied Studies becomes one of the fastest growing learning areas in education, these researchers list the following advantages for our students. TAS allows students to:

- Consider design problems (usually the problems other people face).
- Develop a range of practical skills associated with modern industry.
- Develop an understanding of drawing as a method of communication.
- Work as a team to solve design problems.
- Develop an understanding of aesthetics and its role in the design of everyday items and architecture.
- Learn about functionality in design.
- Develop practical skills that aid them in everyday life.

- Learn the importance of budgeting when costing projects.
- Develop communication skills through designing and group work, and provides a framework for learning and formulating ideas.


#### **BULAHDELAH SHOW STUDENTS' NIGHT:**






