PRINCIPAL'S REPORT:

We have seen an increase in Primary student numbers here at Bulahdelah Central School in 2019. This has allowed us to create

another class in the Primary area. We now have stand alone classes for Year Four, Five and Six.

Our talented students demonstrated the importance of drama and the performing arts in education last week with the outstanding presentation of the Addams Family Musical. The skills developed by all students involved during the production and performance of the musical, including behind the scenes are considerable. Drama students learn to approach situations in an array of different manners which can help them develop creative thinking and new analysis techniques. These techniques also help improve their confidence which benefits public speaking opportunities. I would like to acknowledge all students who were involved in the Addams Family Musical, you did yourselves proud. I would also like to acknowledge Mrs Shultz and staff for all the hours they spent on the school musical. Without the dedication and commitment by staff these events would not occur.

Sun safety remains an important health and safety issue for all schools. Recently I have noticed on Primary sports day students arriving at school without a hat in their possession. We encourage students to wear hats that protect the face, neck and ears when outside for play, sport and teaching. Expectations are Primary students must have a hat to participate in outside activities. Remember, NO HAT, NO PLAY.

Australia has the highest rate of skin cancer in the world. Two in three people who spend their life here develop some form of skin cancer. Most skin cancers are caused by ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun. Children have sensitive skin, which places them at particular risk of sunburn and skin damage. Infact, exposure during the first 15 years of life can greatly increase the risk of developing skin cancer late in life. Most skin cancers can be prevented by reducing exposure to UV radiation.

Primary schools are a significant setting for promoting positive sun protection behavior. Schools have the potential to make an important contribution to reducing the lifetime risk of skin cancer of children in their care because: Students attend school 5 days a week and are often play outdoors when UV radiation levels are high.

- Teachers play an important role in influencing students knowledge, attitudes and behaviour.
- Teachers have the opportunity to educate students and families about the importance of sun protection and help establish lifelong behaviours.
- Sun protection measures complement the OH&S and Duty of Care policies already in place in schools.

On Friday, 22nd February Michelle Gray took 13 students to Newcastle to take part in the 2019 Arts Initiatives NSW Public Schools Secondary Aboriginal Dance Workshops. This was presented by the Arts Unit in partnership with the Bangarra Dance Theatre's Youth Program.

Three dancers from the Bangarra dance troupe were on hand for the day to put the students through their paces. During the course of the day, students took part in activities ranging from a trivia session designed to increase their knowledge of prominent Aboriginal figures. They also learnt basic step work and new choreography of Torres Strait Islander design. The following students who attended the Bangarra workshops were: Dakota Edgerton, Sally Curnow and Abby Fenner were joined by new students Elle Newlin, Izabell Read, Sasha Middleton, Skye Brown and Shakayla Johnson. Other first-time attendees who were already members of BCS's Koori Kids Performance Group were Thomas Doyle, Kasey Biffin, Breanna Foran, Khloe Middleton and Harrison Hughes.

This was the first year that workshops were run in Newcastle which allowed a large number of our students to attend. Our workshop participants will pass on their newly learned skills to other students who make up the Koori Kids Performance group. This will help them prepare new dances for this years NAIDOC activities which will be happening at the end of Term 2. The theme for NAIDOC 2019 is: 'Voice. Treaty. Last week twenty female students from BCS joined with other female students from Dungog High School and Gloucester High School to participate in a two-day Girls in STEM (Science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) workshop. After identifying a problem, students generated ideas and started to develop their own app. It was great seeing this group of girls collaborating and use their STEM skills during this day to produce some quality products.

Young Leaders Day 2019 "One small action can make a difference,"

said Tim Diamond, an executive of the 'Cotton On' Foundation.

That certainly was true when our bus 'popped the inner back tyre' on the freeway, about one hundred metres shy of the Mount White Checking Station on the way to Sydney Sunday, 10th March. Our excursion had now reached adventure status, as we limped in slowly to the truck weighbridge area.

As our Year 6 school leaders- Nate, Blake, Taylah, Isabella, Ellie and Peter alighted with the nine leaders from Tea Gardens Public School, another small action made a difference. The Police Drug Bus pulled in, and along with an RMS Officer, Matt Phair (past BCS teacher) and Mr Gladys they worked together as a team to change the tyre. Without their help we could have been stuck for hours. During our wait we were also invited into the drug bus to have a firsthand look at their operations.

Booral Public School students joined us on arrival in Sydney to visit Madame Tussuads Wax Works and the Sydney Sea-Life Aquarium.

On Monday we attended the International Conference Centre at Darling Harbour for the Young Leaders Conference. The day began with Tim Diamond speaking about the Cotton On Foundation, and by selling cloth bags, water and 'EMPWR' bracelets in their Cotton On stores. They have raised over 90 million dollars which has gone to assist communities in Uganda, Thailand, South Africa and more recently remote Northern Territory communities. Their main aim is to empower youth through quality education. They also set up sustainability projects within these communities. In Uganda they have built not only schools but a special toilet system that uses 'poo-power' to fertilise the crops and produce gas for cooking and reliable electricity for their homes.



Our next speaker was Tamsin Janu, who as a young student of 6 years of age was passionate about writing. After working as a volunteer in Ghana, she studied law at university before becoming an award winning children's author. She is recognised for her

fictional books based around a resilience theme, producing the books titled, "Figgy in the World" and "Blossom." Her advice to us: plan a project you are passionate about and have the courage to carry it through. She encouraged us to always find ways to challenge ourselves, learn new things and be unique!





Following lunch, Olympic swimmer Cate Campbell shared her bag of life with us. Her bag contained:

- Her goggles so she could see her goals clearly through the water.
- Her pull board which encourages her to work to her strengths, turning obstacles into opportunities.
- Her stopwatch so she can check how she is going and what she has already achieved. She needs a person to use the stop watch to guide, support and challenge her objectives
- Her team mates (photo) You need to surround yourself with like-minded people to create a successful environment for yourself.
- Her medals that represent the result after years and years of hard work and an inspiration when things just aren't going quite right.

She ended her talk with her favourite quote from Rudyard Kipling,

"To meet with triumph and disaster, treat the two the same."

What a great way to demonstrate inner resilience!



Our last speaker was Australian Women's cricket medium-paced bowler, Holly Ferling, who talked about her cricketing career as 'scary, but exciting.'

Growing up Holly played in the

men's competition, where there were no favours shown because of her gender, and at the age of 14, scored her first hat trick. Later, as women's cricket was evolving, she played for the Brisbane Heat and was selected to play internationally, but was plagued by injury. She believes these setbacks happen for a reason and you need to use these setbacks as an opportunity to refresh, refocus your thinking and ideas. In the words of a famous song- "I get knocked down, but I get up again."

Isabella: Awesome! It showed us that all successful people start small!

Taylah: Cate Campbell was great because she represented her life with everyday things- So simple! **Blake:** Every famous or successful person there, was once a kid just like us.

Nate: There was a variety of activities. We had the opportunity to meet students from all over NSW.

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Quantitative Reasoning and Problem Solving

It is a common skill for Primary and Secondary school students to use quantitative reasoning to estimate numbers in daily life. For example, when students try to figure out how many jelly beans are in two jars, or how many jelly beans will each of their friends receive if they decide to share with other students. Thus, they will use quantitative reasoning and problem solving to estimate the amount.

In taking this skill further, the Mathematics faculty has initiated the 'Fortnightly Mathematical Challenge' to engage students and their parents in quantitative reasoning and problem solving. The questions will be fun and exciting and be aimed at Bulahdelah Central School students from Primary to Secondary. This will help encourage enthusiasm, boost confidence in mathematics and show the many different ways questions can be asked. Our faculty believes in the importance of problem solving as a means of helping students develop their reasoning skills.

Instructions:

Solutions to the problem showing all necessary working on an A4 sheet of paper are to be put in the box at the top of the stairs leading to the teachers staffroom. Students name and year should be written at the top of the page.

Correct solutions will be placed in a draw for a prize. A Secondary and Primary draw will be made for each question. *John Duncan - Maths teacher*
