#### **PRINCIPAL'S REPORT:**

The school was given the very sad news that Linda Ottignon had passed recently. As well as being a

casual teacher at our school Linda also lived in the Bulahdelah area whilst attending Bulahdelah Central School up until Year 12, 1992. All of us are thinking of her family and friends.

I was fortunate enough recently to accompany our talented school band to the Cedar Wharf Lodge Nursing Home where they performed for the residents. This year the school band was reformed under the direction of Bulahdelah Central School music teacher, Wendy Parsons. I would like to acknowledge and congratulate the students who performed on the day, and to Wendy's commitment and dedication ensuring a successful performance. Considering the school band has only been practising since early this term, and many students had limited musical experience, they performed to a high standard.

The *Benefits* of *Music in Education* helps students develop language and reasoning. Students who have early musical training will develop the areas of the brain related to language and reasoning. Research has found that learning music facilitates learning other subjects and enhances skills that children inevitably use in other areas. Music education facilitates student academic achievement and improves recall and retention of verbal information.

Music involves listening to yourself and to the rest of the ensemble. Musicians need to hear tempos, dynamics, tuning, and harmonies. This helps auditory development in the brain. Reading music includes learning quarter, half, and whole notes, which are essentially fractions. Many musical concepts have mathematical counterparts.

Congratulations to our Primary cricket team who travelled to Tea Gardens on Tuesday, 26th of March and performed admirably and came away with a solid win. A big thank you to Jody Mostyn for her organisation, Chris Gladys who drove the team to and from Tea Gardens.

Thank you also to Geoff Matheson who umpired the game and Erin Matheson who was the scorer.

As this is the last newsletter for the term I would like to acknowledge and thank all staff and students for their continued commitment and hard work throughout the term. It's been a very busy and rewarding term for all. I would also like to thank parents/carers and community members, and our P&C for their continued support of the school. #### **EX-STUDENTS FROM BCS EXCEL:**



Former Bulahdelah Central School Captain Kaitlyn Gregory has been awarded the Charles Sturt University Dean's Award in recognition of her outstanding academic achievements in her first year of tertiary study.



After completing her HSC at BCS in 2017, Kaitlyn gained early entry to study a Bachelor of Paramedicine at the University Port Macquarie campus. She was also awarded a \$5,000 scholarship from the Charles Sturt Foundation to assist with the cost of accommodation.

Kaitlyn studied eight subjects in 2018 including Clinical Practice, Anatomy and Physiology and Paramedic Practice and Principles. Her exceptional results in these courses included many High Distinctions.

Kaitlyn completed her entire school education at BCS. In her final year, she received two Band 6 results in her HSC exams and was named the 2017 School Dux. Kaitlyn said her school education laid the foundations for her successful tertiary studies.

"Paramedicine is a very tedious and demanding course and Bulahdelah definitely prepared me for that.

"I had a great Year Advisor that encouraged me in all aspects of my schooling. An English teacher who gave great feedback and the reason I write essays so well today, and a PDH teacher who taught me to just 'chip away' at the work and not to stress," she said. "My teachers also encouraged independent study at home, particularly during my HSC year. This definitely helped me commit to my studies at university." Wendy Parsons - Music Teacher

**Ben Swift** attended Bulahdelah Central School from Year 9 and completed Year 12 in 2005.

One could say he never took his studies seriously, but enjoyed the social side of school immensely and had the utmost respect for the teachers/mentors during his school years.

While still at school he joined the Rural Fire Service in Tea Gardens/Pindimar as a volunteer. He was welcomed as a young lad and mentored well. He applied himself seriously to all aspects of the volunteer role and was deployed to Victoria in 2009 alongside hundreds of other volunteers tackling the infamous *Black Saturday Bushfires*. Ben was 21 at the time. This reinforced in him the desire to support communities. During this time he also became a Retained Firefighter for NSW Fire & Rescue at the Tea Gardens station and later moved to Newcastle (for more action!). This was great, but his dream was a permanent full time role with NSWFR, he continued to *'keep his eye on the prize'*.

Ben applied year after year and time and time again advanced to certain stages in recruitment, but was unsuccessful. It was tough, often thinking 'why? He never gave up and in 2016 at the age of 29, he was accepted to join the ranks of Fire and Rescue NSW. Ben commenced his training in Sydney and Graduated on 15th December, 2016. A very proud day for everyone.

He is living and working in Sydney stationed at Gordon. He continues to train and learn new skills. Ben also attends preschools, aged care groups and community days teaching fire safety to all ages in the community. He loves to encourage kids to follow their dreams and instills a *'never give up'* attitude. **Thank you Bulahdelah Central for your part in Ben's dream.** Jane Burrage Swift

#### **Commendation for Brave Conduct**

Just after noon on 19th December, 2010, Ben Swift was waiting in a friend's car at a petrol station in New Lambton when he heard people yelling, running frantically and screaming 'fire' as they pointed towards a vehicle at a nearby petrol bowser.



He then noticed a large amount of black smoke coming from the vehicle, which the owner of the car was refuelling. The man dropped the handle of the fuel hose, raced towards the service station's watering can and began splashing water onto the ground.

Mr Swift immediately exited his vehicle and ran towards the nearest fire extinguisher. He activated the extinguisher and ran to the rear of the burning vehicle. Realising that the car was well alight from the underside, he lay down on the station's forecourt and began spraying the extinguisher onto the fire before it could take hold.

Becoming aware that there were three young children in the car, he directed the vehicle's owner to unstrap the two babies from their booster capsules and remove them. The mother of the children then grabbed the third child from the backseat and they all moved to safe place.

Mr Swift continued to extinguish the flames and then encouraged bystanders to assist him to push the vehicle away from other petrol bowsers. Emergency services arrived and took control of the scene.

On the 28th March, 2019 Benjamin Michael Swift received notification that he has been awarded Commendation for Brave Conduct (For acts of bravery considered worthy of recognition) from the Governor-General. Ben will be receiving his award in May.

#### Quantitative Reasoning and Problem Solving Previous Question

Jessica made 121 hotdogs for her Christmas party. There were 16 male and 18 female guests. Each male guest ate 1 more hotdog than each female guest. Each of the female guests, including Jessica, ate an equal number of hotdogs. How many hotdogs did each male guest eat?

#### Solution

The answer to the above question is 4. It is assumed that the guests including Jessica were served in rounds. In round 1, the female guests (including Jessica) ate 19 hotdogs, while their male counterparts consumed 16. The same number was served both female and male guests in rounds 2 and 3. After round 3, the male guests had 48 hotdogs and the female guests (including Jessica) had eaten 57, giving a subtotal of 105. Subtracting 105 from 121 will give us 16, which will be given to the male guests in round 4 because each male guest ate 1 hotdog more. To know the number of hotdogs each male guest ate, we multiply the number of male guest (16) by the number of rounds (4) and divide the result by the number of male guests (16):  $\frac{16 \times 4}{4} = 4$

The diagram below shows a shape made of two equilateral triangles, a square, a regular pentagon and a regular hexagon. The perimeter of the square is 24 cm. What is the perimeter of the whole shape?

#### DEPUTY PRINCIPAL INSTRUCTIONAL LEADER:

What's the Angle on Geometry? I sometimes ponder that geometry is often a forgotten arm that lies within mathematics, and often most don't realise its importance. This

became evident when analysing some recent and not so recent standardised assessments from across a range of schools.

Did you know geometry helps you bring together both sides of your brain? In other words, not just be a left-brain thinker, but also a right-brain thinker. The left-brain is the more logical, technical field, whereas the right-brain is the part that visualises and where artists get their creative inspiration from. Not many people have the ability to make the two connect and work together as one. However, geometry will assist in doing that.

Amazingly geometry begins prior to school, when our children start building with Lego, completing jigsaw puzzles, scribbling patterns on a page, filling containers, or even just building sandcastles on the beach. Research suggests that spatial thinking skills and geometric reasoning play a critical role in the development of problem-solving skills, mathematical learning, and reading comprehension.

Extensive sophisticated spatial reasoning improves the quality of children's early mathematics performance. In the Spatial Reasoning in the Early Years, it explains that these skills include;

They are skills necessary to efficiently pack the boot of a car, cut equal sized slices of pizza, use a map, correctly install a baby car seat from a diagram. These skills are also required for jobs such as air traffic controllers and engineers.

Geometric and spatial skills are also seen as essential job skills for 21st century STEAM jobs – Science, Technology, Engineering, the Arts & Architecture, and Mathematics.

Think of past geniuses that created man-made wonders from the Leaning Tower of Pisa to the Egyptian Pyramids. They all made use of geometry to be able to construct and make their creative thinking come to life. Without the use of geometry it would only have stayed ideas and dreams and we may not have Australian icons such as the Sydney Harbour Bridge or the Opera House.

Geometry is everywhere. Angles, shapes, lines, line segments, curves, and other aspects of geometry are every single place you look - even on this page. Letters themselves are constructed of lines, line segments, and curves!

Take a minute and look around the room you are in, take note of the curves, angles, lines and other aspects which create your environment. Amazing huh?

So take time to encourage your kids to build their spatial reasoning and geometric skills. Who knows they may be the next famous architect, astronomer or a 3D geo-matrix medical imager – and the list goes on. Now I'm wondering if Mr Gladys will let me at the 3D printer and laser cutter – geometry for today's and future students. *Debbie Booth*

#### YOU ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR YOUR CHILDREN'S SAFETY WHEN THEY ARE TRAVELLING TO AND FROM SCHOOL.

## Walk safely

Always hold your children's hands – when walking on the footpath, in the car park and when crossing the road – until they are at least 8 years old.

When your children are between 8 and 10 years old, supervise them very closely when they are near traffic and crossing the road.

When you decide to let your children over 10 years old walk to and from school by themselves, plan the journey together. Practise being a safe pedestrian by:

- keeping to the left of the footpath
- being aware of vehicles coming in and out of driveways
- not being distracted by mobile devices or by other people
- using a safe, alternative way home in wet weather
- showing respect to other pedestrians.

**STOP!** one step back from the kerb. **LOOK!** continuously look both ways. **LISTEN!** for the sounds of approaching traffic. **THINK!** is it safe to cross?

- to always use a safe place to cross the road such as a pedestrian crossing, traffic lights or a school crossing, if available
- to check for turning vehicles before they cross the road and driveways
- never to assume that a driver can see them or will stop for them
- to make eye contact with a driver so they know the driver has seen them
- to wait till the driver has completely stopped their vehicle before they cross the road or driveway.
