# **Entering School Grounds**

Visitors (including parents, carers and volunteers) are not to enter the school grounds without first signing in and out at the Office before entering and leaving school grounds.

Visitors are not to enter the playground or go to the classrooms during class time, or at lunch or recess time. If they wish to bring their child's recess or lunch to school, it must be left at the office and delivery will be arranged. *George Frangos* 

### Road Safety - On and off the bus safely

Your child is most at risk in the minutes after getting off the bus. You can reduce this risk by following these helpful hints.

- Meet your child (or arrange for another trusted adult to meet your child) at the bus stop, never on the opposite side of the road.
- Wait until the bus has been driven away before choosing the safest place to cross the road, then follow the usual road crossing procedures with your children.
- STOP! One step back from the kerb.
- **LOOK!** For traffic to your right, left and right again.

- **LISTEN!** For the sounds of approaching traffic.
- THINK! Whether it is safe to cross.
- Teach your children to keep turning their head in both directions to look and listen for traffic as they cross the road.
- While waiting at the bus stop, stand well away
  from the passing traffic. Never wait right at the
  kerb. Remind your children that when a bus is
  fitted with seatbelts, they must buckle up. The
  best way to keep young children safe from
  traffic injuries is to hold their hand or hold
  them close. You can stop them from running
  into dangerous situations by holding their
  hand when approaching the road/bus.

### **School Zones**

40km/h school zones help protect children on their way to and from schools at the times and places where they are often in high numbers. This lower speed limit reduces the risk and potential severity of a crash.

Not only is this a stressful time for young men and women, parents also tend to ride a roller coaster of emotions throughout this 12 months. While we can't sit their exams for them, there are things we can do to reduce their pressures and help them achieve their best!

# A Team Approach

The formula for success in the HSC is when parents, children and teachers all work together towards the same goals. It's important to remember that your child's teachers will be attempting to help out in as many ways as they can. In almost all cases, they're happy to talk to you or your child about issues that might arise in the year. Schools prefer it when you get in touch before a problem arises and, usually, issues can be worked out quickly and positively. Some specific ways to assist may be to cook them their favourite food, do their washing and ensure they have a private, quiet space to study. Read their English play with them, proofread their essays, and listen to their oral presentations with their permission of course!

# How to best support your child during their HSC

Aim to build a support network of teachers, friends and families around your child for guidance and a helping hand.

- Talk to your child! Keep the lines of communication open at all times (especially during the most stressful).
- Stay informed by attending and speaking to teachers/ university representatives, etc.
- Negotiate your expectations around study, free time and leisure activities. This may require some flexibility on your part.
- Celebrate successes throughout the year. This
  can be as simple as improving the result in a task
  or achieving a short-term goal.
- Aim to reduce the family stressors on your child, especially around examination time.
- Be realistic as to what your son/daughter may be able to achieve in the HSC.
- Provide as much practical, loving support as you can!

# DEPUTY PRINCIPAL INSTRUCTIONAL LEADER:

Honing Hearing Has Benefits

During week three Courtney

Rodgers and I attended professional learning relating to phonological

awareness. Phonological awareness is the ability to hear, identify and say the separate parts of words such as rhymes and letter sounds. It has been shown in numerous studies to be one of the best predictors of initial reading progress.

Beginning readers must develop an understanding that spoken words are made up of individual and distinguishable sounds, rather than thinking of each word as a continual stream. Students need to be able to combine individual phonemes (sounds) to construct a spoken word, and when given a spoken word, break it down into its phonemes. When you engage children in simple phonological awareness tasks, you can give them a head start in success in learning to read and spell.

Simple activities that will help develop your child's phonological awareness include:

- Singing nursery rhymes anywhere and everywhere. This will help your child's language, rhyme, repetition and rhythm. All important components of phonological awareness.
- Read rhyming books, e.g. "The Cat in the Hat" by Dr Seuss and "Doodledum Dancing" by Pamela Allen
- Take turns to come up with words that rhyme, e.g. "What other words rhyme with car?"
- Ask your child to clap with you as you sound out the syllables in words, e.g. sunshine (sun-shine, 2 claps) and wonderful (won-der-ful, 3 claps).
- Teach your child the separate sounds in their name, e.g. Sam has 3 sounds sss-aaa-mmm.
- Talk about the separate sounds in words, e.g. "Do you hear /mmmm/ in the word mmmmoon? Do we hear the /mmmm/ in the word cake? What is the first sound you hear in dog?"
- Play word games that encourage children to learn sounds, e.g. 'I Spy' – "I spy with my my little eye something beginning with /ffff/? What do you think I'm looking at that starts with that sound?"
- Choose a letter and play variations of the game "I went to the shop and I bought...", e.g. I went to the shop and I bought a cup. I went to the shop and I bought a cup and a crocodile, etc. For a trickier version, the next player's item must start with the last sound in the previous player's item,

- e.g. I went to the shop and I bought a cup. I went to the shop and I bought a cup and a pig.
- Become a robot leader! Say this rhyme in a robot voice, sound out simple words, and have your child respond: "I am a robot. Can you help me? Can you tell me what I see? I see a / c//a//p/." Encourage your child to repeat the rhyme in "robot talk" and then blend the final word to answer the robot's question, i.e. cap.
