- Be able to lift examination boxes with exams, and
- Have a basic understanding of some computer programs.

A special ANZAC Commemoration Assembly was held last week to honour all those who have served our nation, both past and present.

"ANZAC Day is a time to honour all those who have served in our defence forces and to remember those who gave their all for our freedom and our way of life. Because of the sacrifices made, we are able to live in a nation of diversity and equality, where we are free to have our own beliefs, be respected and feel safe. ANZAC Day ensures those who sacrificed their lives for us will always be remembered." *Primary Captain Grace McRae.* The ceremony embraced the ANZAC Spirit and the values of bravery, endurance, mateship, resourcefulness and selflessness. The vocal group, accompanied by Year 2 waving poppies and flags, performed '*Spirit of the ANZAC's'* and Year 4/5 told the story of Simpson and his Donkey. In a moving tribute to serving members past and present, staff and students spoke of family and friends who have carried the ANZAC Spirit.

Students also reflected on the cost of freedom. Amongst those honoured was former Bulahdelah Central School student Private John Fraser who landed at Gallipoli on the April, 25 1915. Private Fraser was involved in establishing and defending the front line of the ANZAC beachhead. He died in action two weeks later at the age of 24.

Primary classes made wreaths to lay in memory of all Australians who have died at war.

Easter Hat Parade

On the last Thursday of Term 1, students and teachers participated in and thoroughly enjoyed the Easter Hat Parade. Whilst it was a little

strange without our wonderful parents there cheering us on, we all had a great time, and even a little treat from the Easter Bunny.

A big thank you to Sofie Dorney for organising the event and the other teachers for their support on the day. Thank you also to Wendy Parsons, who throughout these extraordinary times has been videoing events so parents can see what has occurred. Wendy does an amazing job and I thank her for the time and effort she incurs, in ensuring parents can be included in these events and celebrations.

Even Teachers Continue to Learn

On our return to school on Monday the Primary teaching staff participated in professional learning. Our morning session around the A to E grading of students for reports, to ensure consistency not only throughout our school, but also between all NSW Schools. It was exceptional training and very timely as teachers begin to prepare for Semester 1 reports. Following this, we then did some professional development based on Number Sense and Reading Fluency. Both these concepts will feature strongly in the new Mathematics and English syllabus, which will be introduced to schools in Term 1, 2022. Number sense is the ability for students to recognise numbers and patterns, explain their answers and adapt their learning to everyday situations. Reading fluency is an essential reading skill which supports students understanding (comprehension) of what they have read or are reading.

How can you assist your child in building their number sense?

• Show your child how numbers and counting apply to everyday life. Use number words, point out numbers and involve your child in counting activities, e.g. have your child help you measure ingredients for a recipe (older students and do this independently) or count out the number of spoonful's or cups. Discuss how things or amounts are more, less, bigger or smaller.

• Count items around the house, e.g. how many tea-towels do we have in the cupboard?

• Use items from around the house to experiment with addition and subtraction, and more or less activities.

 Read stories, sing songs and recite poems that include numbers and counting, e.g. "The Very Hungry Caterpillar" or "Too Many Pears."

• Play simple board or card games.



How can you assist your child build reading fluency?

• Model fluent reading by reading to your children daily, so they can see and hear what effective, fluent reading is like. With older children you can take turns to read a page each.

• Read together out loud. This is a strategy that students are used to when working with their teacher during guided reading (younger students) or close reading (older students) groups.

• Re-read favourite books, as this is a great way to build fluency through familiarity. As a child becomes more accustomed to reading familiar books, you will observe that their speed, accuracy and expression will continue to improve. This in turn assists your child's comprehension skills.

Remember, "The more they read, the better they get!" Debbie Booth

5 Entries must be framed (where necessary - see 'Size of Artworks') with secure hooks and tight wire/ string attached ready for hanging. Any work mounted on thin cardboard will NOT be hung.

6 Delivery of exhibits: Final date for delivery to Pacific Palms Public School by 2pm Wednesday 2nd June 2021. Any artwork delivered late will not be included in the exhibition as works will need to be hung for judging.

7 All artworks will be on display:

Saturday, 5 June – 2:00pm to 4:00pm Awards will be announced at 2.30pm

Sunday, 6 June – 10am to 4pm

8 All winning and highly commended artworks will also be on display at the main Exhibition and Sale on the June Long Weekend.

9 The organisers will endeavour to hang all artworks, however, works not conforming to the entry conditions will not be included in the judging.
10 Wet works will not be hung.

Size of Artworks

Artworks on Paper:

A3 size or smaller (including frame) – any medium – ready to hang with wire/string securely attached.

Artworks on Canvas:

50x60cm stretched canvas or board, or smaller – any medium – ready to hang with wire/string securely attached.

Photographs:

A3 or smaller (including frame) ready to hang with wire/string securely attached. NB: Please ensure that any A3 Frames have a narrow outer frame, so as not to exceed the size criteria. An A4 artwork framed in an A3 frame will allow for a border within the frame, however, if framing an A3 artwork in an A3 frame it will have NO border (see back of entry form for visual explanation).

High School artists (Ages 13, 14, 15, 16) may exhibit any artwork done at school no matter the size. Please ensure that your artwork is able to be hung with secure hooks and wire/string securely attached.
