PRINCIPAL'S REPORT:

The Department of Education has a paramount duty to ensure the safety and well-being of students and staff in attendance at its schools.

This is a duty that the Department and I as Principal of Bulahdelah Central School take very seriously. You have a right to expect, when sending your children to school, that they will be safe.

We also have legal obligations under the Work Health and Safety Act 2011 to eliminate or minimise risks to health and safety (so far as is reasonably practicable).

The Department already has a strict policy specifying no weapons being allowed at school. To date there has been a legal exemption for knives carried for religious purposes (including a kirpan carried by some Sikh students).

Following a recent incident, the Department has now implemented a temporary ban on students, staff and visitors carrying any form of knife into government schools (including those carried for religious purposes). This temporary ban is to ensure the safety and well- being of students and staff at all of our schools.

The Department is currently working with a range of community stakeholders including religious organisations to develop a new policy to enable students, where appropriate, to continue to express their faith, while still maintaining safety within the school context.

From Wednesday, 19 May 2021, and until further notice, no students may carry a knife while at school, even those worn for genuine religious reasons. We request that parents and carers talk with their children to make sure they understand this change. Knives carried for religious purposes, including kirpans, will need to be kept at home for the foreseeable future.

We recognise this is a sensitive issue for many within the community and wish to assure you that the Department will be working urgently to find a solution which respects every student's faith alongside the safety of everyone in our school. We ask all parents to support the school with these changes, parent information on knives in schools can be found on the No knives at school – parent factsheet. Parents may also find the information on the No knives at school – student factsheet useful in their discussions with their children.

No knives at school

Parent factsheet

There is no good reason to bring a knife to school.

NSW now has the toughest knife laws in Australia. As a parent, you need to be aware of these laws, as you can also be charged if you allow your child to carry a knife.

No knives allowed at school under any circumstances

If a student has a knife at school the principal may call the police.

The student may be expelled or suspended immediately. Possessing a knife includes your child simply having one in their bag or locker. Having a knife for self-protection is also illegal. If you are concerned about your child's wellbeing or safety, contact the principal.

Tough penalties apply for children convicted of knife offences, including gaol sentences of up to 25 years if someone is injured with a knife during an assault.

Every child has the right to feel safe and secure at school. There is no good reason for a child to ever have a knife at school.

If you want to talk about children and knives at school, please contact the principal.

What kind of knives are prohibited?

As school policy is designed to keep all students safe, no type of knife is allowed at school. That means no butter knives or fruit knives in lunchboxes, or knife tools for craft purposes.

Flick knives, ballistic knives, sheath knives, push daggers, trench knives, butterfly knives and star knives are all prohibited.

Your child cannot bring any item to school that can be used as a weapon (such as a chisel).

In lessons requiring the use of knives, for example cooking or trades, your child's teacher will supply and supervise the use of the tools. There are some senior subjects, such as hospitality, where children may be required to have their own knives.

Your child's school will advise you about these courses and the procedures for carrying knives legally to and from school.

The law makes parents responsible

You need to make certain your child is aware of the school's rules and the State laws about knives.

If you allow your child to carry or possess a knife at school or in a public place, you can be charged.

The police can search any child they suspect of having a knife. They can confiscate any dangerous object they might find during the search.

Your child must comply with such a police search, or they may be arrested and charged.

It is also illegal for anyone to sell a knife to anyone who is less than 16 years old.

Telephone interpreter service

If you would like more information please call the school principal. If you need an interpreter to assist with your enquiry, please call the Telephone Interpreter Service on **131 450** and ask for an interpreter in your language.

Tell the operator the phone number you want to call and the operator will get an interpreter on the line to assist you with the conversation. You will not be charged for this service.

No knives at school

Student factsheet

There is no good reason to bring a knife to school

It's against the law for students to have a knife in a public place or at school. NSW now has the toughest knife laws in Australia and you need to be aware of these laws.

No knives allowed at school under any circumstances

- You are not allowed to have any type of knife at school, including flick knives, sheath knives, push daggers, trench knives, butterfly knives, star knives or any item that can be used as a weapon (such as a chisel).
- Your Principal may call the police and you may be expelled or suspended from school immediately if you are found possessing or carrying a knife.
- You can now receive a fine of over \$2,000 or be sent to jail for many years for knife related offences.
- This may happen if you just have the knife at school in your bag or locker, and don't use the knife, or threaten anyone with it.
- You are not allowed to carry a knife, even if you believe it is for your own protection. If you feel intimidated, worried that someone will harm you or you're being bullied, talk to your school principal, counsellor or year advisor.

Keeping school safe

The police can search you in public places and at school if they suspect you possess a knife. They can confiscate any dangerous object they might find during the search.

If police tell you they are going to search you because they suspect you of having a knife at school, you must comply.

- If you do not cooperate with the police, they can arrest and charge you.
- It is also illegal for anyone to sell you a knife if you are under 16 years old.

Tough penalties apply

There are very tough sentences for assaults or threats that involve a knife, for example, if you are in a fight and wound someone with a knife.

If you commit this sort of crime with other young people, the sentences are even tougher. In some cases, the jail term can be for 14 to 25 years. Your parents can also be charged if they know and allow you to carry a knife in public places or at school.

There is no good reason for you to ever bring a knife to school.





Parents as Career Supporters

Parents and carers play an important role in helping their children to make career choices. They are the greatest influence on their children's career choice. Making career choices may be challenging. The "world of work" is complex and careful investigation is needed so that careers can be properly planned.

The workplace children will enter may be very different from when their parents started working.

Some strategies to help your teenagers with their career choices:

Remain positive

No matter how complex and confusing the changes in employment and training may seem, the majority of school leavers now have access to a number of education and vocational pathway opportunities.

Try to avoid the "What are you going to do/be when you leave school?" Type questions. These questions are of ten very confronting. Instead take the opportunity to talk about career options whenever possible, for example when a news item appears on a current affairs program or when a University/TAFE Open Day is approaching.

Encourage your child to develop a positive self-esteem

Focus on their achievements – but not just at school. Acknowledge their efforts in all their activities – keeping their room tidy, participating in sport, community activities, set ting goals and achieving them.

Show them you believe in them!

Allow for a change in direction

It is very unusual for a student to choose a career at a very early age and never waiver in their choice. Be prepared for changes in direction and encourage your teenager to continue to explore a variety of options.

Encourage them to learn from their mistakes

Even if you feel uncertain about their choice, remain positive as they make their first steps towards their career. It isn't the end of the world if they choose the wrong work experience or subject. Discovering that a previous career interest is not for them is a positive step in the decision making process as it gives them the time to re-assess their interests and to broaden their options.

Encourage them to find an industry contact

When a teenager begins to express an interest in a particular career, if it is possible, help them to establish links with someone in that field. This person can then provide a direct, first hand information link with that particular occupation or industry.

Networking

St udent s should be actively encouraged to develop an information network themselves. This network could well be friends, neighbours, part-time work employers, work experience employers and your family's builder/car repairer/plumber/accountant (depending on their career interests) and other contacts made by the student. The network serves two purposes – it allows students to gain realistic insights into their chosen career and it broadens their chances of finding jobs as a large number of vacancies are only advertised by word-of-mouth.

Share your experiences

Talk to your teenagers about your own experiences of work and study and your reasons for making particular career decisions. Discuss the problems you have faced and how you dealt with them. Speak openly of the positive and negative aspects of the jobs you have done.





Multi-purpose Permission Notes

Last week another copy of our multi-purpose note for students was sent home to those students who have not returned their note.

This note allows students to attend:

- short walking excursions around the school and the neighbourhood,
- watch appropriate educational PG movies associated with their learning,
- participate in research activities such as surveys and observation by university students and research observers.

Without this note returned, students will be unable to participate in these activities.

NAPLAN (National Assessment Program Literacy & Numeracy)

Students in Years 3, 5 and 9 have been participating in NAPLAN over the past two weeks. Like the Check-In Assessments, the students participated in writing, reading and mathematic assessments. The results from NAPLAN will be available sometime next term. Thank you to Rod Pye and Kim Rigley for organising and overseeing these assessments.

Where Would We Be Without Measurement?

One area, our check-in assessments (Years 4, 6 and 8) identified as being slightly weak across the board was in measurement.

We use measurement in many different ways and in many different everyday activities.

In cooking we measure ingredients, building work that requires precise measurement and even filling the car with fuel requires measurement. It is all around us, EVERYWHERE! Just by drawing your child's attention to your own use of measurements you are helping them to absorb the concepts that they need. What can you do to help build these skills further at home?

- Involve your child with measurement when cooking, building and sewing.
- Read and interpret timetables.
- Estimate how long it will take to play a game of dominoes or cards.
- Use a family calendar to record special events and ask questions like, "how many weeks until school holidays?"
- Give your child a tape measure and let them experiment with it
- Discuss sporting results (A great one for the upcoming Olympics) such a swimming and running times, and long and high jump distances.
- When wrapping presents talk about the size of the paper or gift bag and if it will be long enough or wide enough.

Who knows the list of activities involving measurement is definitely immeasurable. *Debbie Booth*




