The students completed individualised landscape works, each with a personal theme and style that reflected the artists interest, experiences and abilities.





Well done also to Angus Devon (Sport Leader), Sally Curnow (Koori Leader) and Kalani Minns (SRC


Leader) who have successfully fulfilled their roles on the Student Representative Council. BCS thanks you all.











# Chris Hoare Rugby League Cup between Gloucester High and BCS.

Chris Hoare was a student at Bulahdelah Central School from Kindergarten through to Year 12. Chris's parents, well-known local identities Steve and Jenny, were always very proud of Chris's achievements and gave great support in all his endeavor's as did his younger brother Brenton.

Chris was born in February, 1976 and tragically died in a car accident on 27 December, 1996. BCS decided, under the guidance of teacher Damien Keen, to celebrate Chris's achievements by playing matches in the Under 14 and Open Team categories against Gloucester High School each year. The inaugural match was played on 20 May, 2004, refereed by Bill Harrigan, well known former referee.

Chris was a capable and hardworking student who achieved to his potential academically and achieved his Higher School Certificate in 1994.

He also took on various roles within the school by being a member of the Student Representative Council, participating in school musicals and fundraising activities. However, it was at sport that Chris excelled. His potential was evident during his Primary school years when he was the Junior Boys Athletic, Tennis and Swimming Champion. In secondary school he represented BCS in athletics and Cross Country at Zone level and also in football.

In 1993 while in Year 11 Chris was selected to the Manning Zone Open Rugby League Team and continued his school sporting achievements by being the 17 Years Boy Athletics Champion as well as the School Sportsman of the Year.

In 1994, as a Year 12 student, Chris was Hunter Region representative in the Open Rugby League team. Other sporting achievements include competing in the Bulahdelah King of the Mountain triathlon an endurance race (1983 & 1984) which he successfully completed, both times being the youngest to finish. His Indoor Cricket Team won the Winter Competition and he was Under 16 Years Taree Old Bar "Best Back "in 1992.

Under the headline of "Big Future for Local Footballer" in a local newspaper, it was announced that a young Bulahdelah footballer had been picked to play against Queensland and Western Australia. Chris Hoare, a member of the Under 18 Rugby League team which regularly played in the Tea Gardens/Hawks Nest-Bulahdelah area each week was picked to play with the Newcastle Under 18 representative squad against Queensland Under 18. This match was held at Lang Park and played before the third test against New Zealand in 1993. During this match, he scored the winning try for Newcastle. Following that match Chris was picked to play in the Under 17 Newcastle representative squad to play against Western Australia on 17 July, 1993.

In 1994 he played in the Under 19 Country Championship at Coffs Harbour and in September, 1994 Chris received confirmation of his selection in the Newcastle Knights Jersey Flegg Summer Training Squad.

The Chris Hoare Cup will be held on Wednesday, 23 July at Bulahdelah sporting fields. Hopefully we will be able to bring the cup home this year.

#### **Beautiful Blue Butterfly**

The air swirled clear with the rising sun, not yet thickened by the pollution of intelligence as it would become in mere hours. Scents were only of natural origins; grass speckled with dew drops, abundant odours of diversified flowers and plants, fresh rain water settled into birdbaths left to pose above garden gnomes and stone-edged flower beds. The chirping of the birds was envious to all who perceived. How could such joy be experienced at this early hour? Was it a mask assumed to prove a fake identity of an unproblematic life? Or was it truly an action of happiness, smooth and peaceful as little quantities of pieces of life are? Whatever the case be, the chirrup contributed profoundly to a setting furthest away from corruption as possible. And amongst the organic smells and sounds, poised on a new, Kelly green leaf still sprouting from its stem, was a most majestic butterfly. Its petite wings, a bold azure blue thickly outlined in honourable black with the thinnest of segmented strips, also black against the blue, texturing each wing with subtle beauty. Both wings a modestly glamorous shape curving unsymmetrically by top and bottom halves. In flight, the creature floated and glided along the breeze, unconcerned of the worries in the world.

At least that was what the scene looked like from afar. A dot of antagonism in a place not quite as corruption-free as one might hope for.

The butterfly cuts through the pellucid air with the elegance of a pearl, the grace of a diamond. The innocent fluttering of blurred-blue wings drawing attention like a pretty picture, although this picture hid power underneath a layer of fake morals. Disguised by the harmless flittering, a darkness stained the butterfly's soul. A persistent plague surviving on hate for years, unbeaten by positives of life and overtaking the creature. Advancing little bit by little bit, motivated to control the entirety of the butterfly. Winning a war in which the butterfly had changed from defender to refugee. The darkness ate away at the heart, mind and life of such a brave, bewildering, benevolent, beautiful being.

The butterfly, doomed to carry such a burden of blackness, still glided around the peaceful garden, hiding away it's worries and fears, only showing what was expected of such a magnificent creature. Possessing the knowledge of the real identity of itself was a secret none would ever be aware of. 


The Year 7 mathematics students had an assignment Designing a Clock where they had to create a clock based on integers.

The example on the right shows a clock face, with each number represented by a very simple mathematical question. Each question has only one operation. Their task was to design a clock so that each number from 1 to 12 is represented by a question involving integers, using two or more operations. For example, 13 – 6 x 2 could be used for the number 1.

The task required them to demonstrate the extent to which they could apply the order of operations to evaluate expressions involving integers.

# NIPS (Non-attendance Interview Program) PROGRAM

This program will be implemented at the beginning of Term 3 for Years 3-8 in conjunction with Home School Liaison Officer.

The Department of Education has implemented attendance as part of most schools improvement plans.

Regular attendance by students is recognised as the basis upon which a student acquires access to a good education.

State Legislation requires that all children between the ages of 6 and 17 years are enrolled at a state or registered school and for them to attend school on each day that the school is open for instruction.

The Department of Education operates a School Liaison Program. Home School Liaison Officers are teachers with a range of educational and professional experiences with expertise in the area of student welfare.


A Home School Liaison Officer, together with a member of staff, will be interviewing identified children with attendance problems.

The following criteria will determine whether your child is interviewed:

- An attendance rate lower that 90% and
- More than 3 unexplained absences or
- A regular pattern of absences or
- Extended periods of illness.

I am sure that you will support us in this important area of student welfare.

We are hopeful that this process will improve the level of attendance of identified students.


